The painting contains clues that tell you the meaning of the allegory. To figure out the meaning, identify the various objects in the painting—the symbols—and imagine what they could represent.



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- 3 Find the label next to this painting; the title tells you the answer. Were you close? If you did not guess the allegory correctly, why do you think it was not apparent to you? Discuss with a partner.
- **Next**, **look directly below** the man and the horse. Do you notice something written in the cartouche? (A cartouche is a scroll-like tablet used either to provide space for an inscription or to serve as an ornament.)
  - a The cartouche contains an Italian inscription, E cosi desio me mena, which means "And so desire carries me along." This is from the Italian poet Francesco Petrarch's Song Book, written about 1342.
  - **b** How do you think this inscription relates to the allegory? \_

5 Of all the animals the artist might have painted, why do you think he chose a horse? How does it relate to the allegory?
